FIRST OFFICIAL ACTIONS OF NEW BOARD OF TRUSTEES ARE REPORTED

Oakland took its final steps toward independence last week with the formal seating on the new Board of Trustees and their selection of Donald D. O'Dowd as the University's first President. O'Dowd served as Chancellor since last February, and his appointment as President followed a review of his performance in that office.

The Trustees also chose from among their own membership Marvin L. Katke of Bloomfield Hills to serve as chairman and Otis M. Smith of Detroit as vice chairman. They named John DeCarlo, OU's assistant chancellor for the professional performing arts, as secretary to the Board, and Robert W. Swanson, director of business affairs, as treasurer. The provost's office has already publicized action of the Board of Trustees to reappoint three academic deans, George T. Matthews (College of Arts and Sciences), Laszlo Hetenyi (education) and John E. Gibson (engineering).

Among other items handled in a full agenda were approval of the current year's operating budget of \$12,024,169 and of a budget request for 1971-72 of \$15,845,169. The Trustees approved a large number of personnel actions involving faculty and staff, accepted gifts and grants totaling \$931,594, approved salary and wage adjustments for the current year, and adopted several resolutions related to general operation of the University since it became independent from MSU last July 1. APPLETON, RICE ASSUME FACULTY APPOINTMENTS

The granting of faculty status to OU staff members James R. Appleton and F. Edward Rice were among faculty appointments approved Tuesday by the Board of Trustees. All of the appointments were effective with the start of fall term. Appleton, recently named acting vice chancellor for student affairs, was given faculty rank of associate professor in the College of Arts and Sciences. Rice, clinical psychologist and associate director of Psychological Services, was appointed associate professor of psychology. The new faculty appointments:

Ölkü U. Bates, visiting assistant professor of art. A former teaching fellow at the University of Michigan, she holds an M.A. degree and has completed her doctorate studies in art history at the U-M. Her undergraduate work was done at the University of Istanbul.

Irvin H. Bromall, assistant professor of political science. He was on the faculty of Ohio University from 1966-70. He received B.A. and M.A. degrees from Penn State and a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin.

Algea O. Harrison, assistant professor of psychology. She is completing her doctoral work at the University of Michigan, where she received an M.A. degree, and holds a B.S. from Bluefield State College. She was a school diagnostician and research assistant for Highland Park Schools, 1966-69.

Charles C. Hollen, instructor in psychology. He has been a teaching assistant and research assistant at MSU since 1965 and is completing doctoral work there. His B.A. and M.A. degrees are also from MSU.

Edward J. Recchia, visiting assistant professor of English. A former faculty member of Ohio State University and Wayne State University, he holds Ph.B. and M.A. degrees from the University of Detroit, and a Ph.D. from Ohio State.

Michael D. Sevilla, assistant professor of chemistry. He has served as principal investigator in the radiation chemical program of the Atomic Energy Commission since 1968. His B.S. degree is from San Jose State and Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin.

NEW FEES APPROVED Tuition and fee schedules for the current academic year were approved Tuesday by the Board of Trustees. Tuition was unchanged this year, amounting to an average of \$600 for full-time Michigan students and an average of \$1,425 for full-time out-of-state students. Changes in the fee schedule as approved by the Board included the new \$10 student center fee and the increase in health service fee from \$15 to \$30 a year. Dormitory rates were set at \$1,046, a \$52 increase, for two semesters.

ATTORNEY APPOINTED The appointment of James L. Howlett of Pontiac as university attorney was approved Tuesday by the Board of Trustees. He has been serving in that same capacity for a number of years under an arrangement approved by the MSU Board of Trustees.

GIFTS, GRANTS TO UNIVERSITY TOTAL \$931,594

Gifts and grants totaling \$931,594 were accepted by the Board of Trustees Tuesday. They represent funds received by the University since the June meeting of the MSU Board. Largest single grant was one of \$150,517 from the Michigan Employment Security Commission for three institutes in vocational guidance for 80 MESC employees. The grant will be under the direction of William Moorehouse (education).

Two grants totaling \$182,285 (representing federal funds) were received from the Pontiac Public Schools in support of programs involving teacher education. One, in the sum of \$116,310, is under the direction of Jacqueline Lougheed (education) in support of training teachers for work in inner city schools. The other, for \$65,975, is under the direction of Roderic Righter (education) to train teachers in working with disadvantaged youth.

Among other major grants were three that continue support of research by members of the Institute of Biological Sciences. These were \$73,082 from National Institutes of Health, under direction of V.N. Reddy, for a research project on blood-aqueous barrier in diabetes; \$71,971 from the National Eye Institute, under direction of V. Everett Kinsey, for a study of intraocular fluid dynamics, and \$47,051 from the National Institutes of Health, under direction of Michael Riley, to study the control of corneal hydration. A \$40,000 grant from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration was received in support of bio-systems engineering research, under the direction of John E. Gibson (engineering).

BUDGET SUBMITTED

The 1971-72 operating fund budget request approved Tuesday by the Board of Trustees for submission to the Bureau of the Budget seeks a state appropriation of \$10,605,169, an increase of \$3,451,260 over the current year's appropriation. The budget total is \$15,845,169 as compared with the current sum of \$12,024,169. Requested increases in salaries and wages, plus related retirement and fringe benefits, amount to \$2,741,000 of the total new funds asked.

PAY RAISES OK'D

Retroactive approval of salary and wage adjustments for University employees for the 1970-71 year was voted Tuesday by the Board of Trustees. A summary of the adjustments presented for the Trustees' approval showed increases averaged 7.8 percent for faculty, 8.1 percent for administrative-professional staff, 8.0 percent for clerical-technical staff, and 7.6 percent for service staff. The total cost of the increase was shown as \$535,554.

WORK AUTHORIZED

Board of Trustee authorization was given Tuesday for planning and engineering work involved in remodeling Hannah Hall chemistry labs, resurfacing North Foundation Drive, and building a new road from the Performing Arts Building to South Meadow Brook Drive. Funds for the projects were provided by the Legislature last spring. They total \$273,000, with \$200,000 earmarked for the new road.

IT'S WILSON WEEKEND Faculty and staff are invited to take part in this week's Wilson Weekend festivities. Friday evening activities include a folk concert and hayride, centered in the Belgian Barns area west of Hannah Hall. Saturday events will be in Oakland Center, with dinner in the multi-purpose room at 7:30 followed by a cabaret dance in the Promethium Grille at 9 p.m. There will be a faculty-staffed casino in the Abstention coffee house, while Wilson era memorabilia will be on display upstairs in the Wilson Lounge. Dinner tickets are \$3.50 and should be bought in the Alumni Relations Office, 269 South Foundation, by Thursday.
