New Online Databases

The Medical Library has recently subscribed to three new databases as part of the McGraw-Hill Access collection focused on neurology, pediatrics, and surgery.

	The Neurology Collection includes 11 eTextbooks in neurology, neuroanatomy, ophthalmology, such as <i>Adams & Victor's Principles of Neurology</i> and <i>Clinical Neurology</i> , as well as lectures, videos, and images. You may also create a custom self assessment exam from McGraw-Hill's Specialty Board Review: Neurology.
	AccessPediatrics houses over 20 eTextbooks in pediatrics including <i>Rudolph's Pediatrics, 22e</i> and the Pediatric Practice series in cardiology, endocrinology, gastroenterology, infectious diseases, neurology and ophthalmology. Also features <i>Case Files: Pediatrics</i> and the ability to create a custom self assessment exam from <i>PreTest: Pediatrics</i> , <i>McGraw-Hill's Specialty Board Review: Pediatrics</i> , and <i>Rudolph's Pediatrics</i> to prep for the Step 2 exam.
	AccessSurgery is similar to AccessPediatrics and includes 20 eTextbooks in various surgery topics, including <i>Schwartz's Principles of Surgery, 10e</i> and <i>Zollinger's Atlas of Surgical Operations, 9e</i> . Also features self-assessment items from <i>Case Files: Surgery</i> and <i>PreTest: Surgery</i> as well as descriptions of specific surgical procedures.
