## CADET ENGINEERING PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

An official announcement was made last week on the establishment of a pilot program within Upward Bound-Oakland in an effort to increase the number of disadvantaged students entering into engineering careers. Known as Cadet Engineering, the program takes high school students at the completion of ninth grade, brings them to the campus for a six-week summer session, and continues with the student's pre-college preparation until graduation from high school. The first group of students, who began the program at the start of the current Summer School session, are being instructed by Professors Glenn Jackson and Gilbert Wedekind in the School of Engineering.

## SINGER AT U.N.

Philip Singer (sociology/anthropology and Allport College) attended the First World Youth Assembly at the United Nations where he observed and taped a number of interviews with delegates. He also attended the meeting of the United Revolutionary Council, an *ad hoc* group which also met in New York and which was attended by Abbie Hoffman, William Kuntzler, the Women's Liberation Movement, the Gay Liberation Movement and the Black Panthers.
