## IBS Wins Construction Grant

The Institute of Biological Sciences has won a National Eye Institute (NEI) construction grant to increase its laboratory facilities for glaucoma research and for shared electron microscopy and tissue culture analysis.

OU is one of only five institutions nationwide to share in \$2,000,000 in NEI construction funds. OU receives \$254,250 and the university provides an additional 25 percent in matching funds.

The funds awarded will be used to construct approximately 1,800 sq. ft. of new laboratory space which will house a glaucoma research laboratory, shared facilities for electron microscopy, a tissue culture laboratory, and a biochemical and instrumentation lab. Under the terms of the award, these facilities are to be used exclusively for eye research at Oakland University. Two members of the Department of Biological Sciences who are also involved in eye research will share the facilities.

President Joseph E. Champagne praised the institute members for their productive research contributions that have brought the university increasing recognition in this country and abroad.

Institute director Venkat N. Reddy called the grant a "tremendous recognition of the institute and of Oakland University's commitment to eye research." He said the expansion will aid the institute in its competition for a "CORE" facilities grant that will provide funds for collaborative vision research and the major equipment requests not normally supported through NEI individual research grants. Such a grant would be an additional recognition of the strength of the overall research being conducted at the institute, Reddy said.

Since the institute opened in 1968 it has received more than \$7 million in grant and construction support, much of it coming from the NEI.

At the dedication last year of the V. Everett Kinsey Memorial Laboratory of the

institute, Edward McManus, deputy director of the NEI, called the Institute of Biological Sciences one of the outstanding facilities in the country for the conducting of basic eye research.

The other eye research facilities to receive NEI construction funds were the University of California at San Francisco, Emory University, the Medical College of Wisconsin and Rockefeller University. The Rockefeller University grant was made to accommodate the research of the new director, Dr. Torsten Wiesel, last year's Nobel Laureate in medicine, who is leaving Harvard University for the new post.

Reddy said the OU construction award was made on the basis of scientific merit of the overall eye research program at an institution, after review and recommendation of two national peer review groups—The Vision Research Program Committee of the NEI and the National Advisory Eye Council.

## United Way Opens

The United Way Fund Drive will be conducted at Oakland University from October 25 through November 5.

Each university employee will receive a letter of explanation, information about United Way projects and services, and payroll deduction card. Last year 264 of Oakland's 900 employees contributed a total of \$23,356.00 to the United Way, and this year the United Way representatives would like to increase that amount by 10%. Arrangements are being made this year with University Congress to offer students the opportunity to participate in the United Way Fund Drive.

In 1983, 58 United Way agencies will serve more than 85,000 people in Oakland County alone. Oakland University is one of the institutions which benefits from United Way funds. In 1982 Oakland University received funding from the United Way for the Heart Rehabilitation Program, biological research grants, student internships in United Way agencies and a beneficiary study.

## Faculty News Notes

Munibur Rahman and Carlo Coppola (both modern languages/area studies) participated in the first international Conference on Urdu held in Toronto on September 24-25. The meeting was jointly sponsored by the Urdu Society of Canada and the University of Toronto. Rahman was one of six major Urdu poets who were invited to read from their recent works. Other poets came from India, Pakistan, Lebanon and Great Britain. Coppola's paper was entitled "The Progressive Movement and Urdu Poetry: A 50-Year Retrospective." The proceedings of the conference will be published by the University of Toronto.

Boaz Kahana, psychology, presented a paper entitled "Issues of Researcher/Organizational Intervention in Studying Facilities for the Aged" at the annual meetings of the American Psychological Association held Aug. 23-28 in Washington, D.C. The paper was part of a symposium on conducting research with the aged.

Professor Philip Singer, sociology/ anthropology and Center for Health Sciences, has been designated as a research consultant for the Center for Scientific Anomalies Research, Ann Arbor. The facility is connected with the journal *Zetetic Scholar* which is a scientific review of claims of anomalies for the paranormal.

Esther M. Goudsmit, biological sciences, was a participant in the first International Symposium on Molluscan Endocrinology held in August in Amsterdam, Holland. Her topic was "Regulation of Galactogen Synthetase Activity in Helix Pomatia." Proceedings of the symposium will be published early in 1983 as a book, *Molluscan Neuroendocrinology*, J. Lever and H.H. Boer, editors, North Holland Publishing Company.

Richard Haskell, engineering, had his book, *Apple BASIC*, published in June by

Prentice-Hall. It is one of a series of BASIC books written by Professor Haskell which includes *PET/CBM BASIC*, published last March, and *TRS-80 Extended Color BASIC* and *Atari BASIC*, to be published early next year.

George J. Gamboa, biological sciences, presented a paper entitled "Social Integration in a Primitively Eusocial Wasp" this August at the Ninth Congress of the International Union for the Study of Social Insects held at the University of Colorado. Gamboa has been invited to present a paper entitled "Clumping Patterns of Overwintering Social Wasps: Effects of Relatedness" this November at the Entomological Society of America meetings in Toronto, Ontario.

Ronald M. Horwitz, economics and management, spoke to the Detroit Chapter of the Institute of Internal Auditors on Sept. 14 on the topic "Graduate Research: Can It Advance the Internal Audit Profession?"

Alan Reinstein, economics and management, spoke on "How Universities Are Changing Their Accounting Curriculum to Meet Future Economic Needs" at a recent seminar of the Detroit Chapter of the National Association of Accountants.

## Telefund Opens Nov. 1

The Oakland University Alumni Association has slated its Annual Alumni Telefund to be held in the Katke-Cousins Golf Course Clubhouse November 1 through 23 from 7 to 9:30 p.m. Graduates across the country will be contacted and asked to make their annual fund pledges.

Barry Klein, '68, association treasurer and chairperson of the 1982 campaign, announced that this year's goal has been established at \$70,000. He stressed that telefund proceeds are the backbone of the Annual Fund Drive—some \$58,000 of the total \$101,000 in alumni gifts in 1981-82 resulted from telefund pledges.

At least 24 persons are needed on each of the 17 nights of the drive, not only to staff the 17 telephones, but to perform such other critical tasks as typing address changes, sorting pledge slips, and stuffing envelopes. ## Technology Lecture

The New Industrial Technology Institute of the State of Michigan has research goals that should bring a variety of benefits to the state, the acting director told an OU audience Oct. 4.

Professor Arch Naylor spoke at the program arranged by the College of Arts and Sciences. He said the new institute would offer research and problem solving capabilities to industry, an information and communication center to be used by industry and participating educational institutions, train managers to handle the new technology, and examine the social problems that robotics and computerized manufacturing could bring.

Vadin Kuznetsov of the Russian embassy in Washington, D.C., will lecture on "USSR Perceptions of U.S. Intentions" on Oct. 26 in Gold Rooms A and B of the Oakland Center.

Kuznetsov's 8 p.m. talk is part of the New-Charter College lecture series "Arms for Armageddon: Dilemmas of the Cold War."

The lecture completes part I of the series, the "Cold War Revisited." The second phase of the program opens Nov. 2 under the general topic "Nuclear Peril." The Nov. 2 lecturer is Bishop Thomas Gumbleton speaking on "Nuclear Standoff and the Ethical Imperative."

Other lectures, all at 8 p.m. in the Gold Rooms, are: Nov. 9, U.S. Representative John Conyers "Economic Consequences of the Nuclear Arms Race"; Nov. 16, Lillian Genser, Wayne State University, "The Threat of Nuclear War To Children and Youth"; Nov. 28, Professor Alvin Saperstein, Wayne State University, "War vs. Security In a Nuclear Age"; and Nov. 30, Roger Molander of the Ground Zero Campaign, "Nuclear War: What's In It for You?"
