U.S. GRANTS ACCEPTED The MSU Board of Trustees accepted a total of \$453,456 in gifts and grants to OU last week, including \$417,740 from the U.S. Office of Education to support three financial aids programs under the dean of students office. These major grants were \$255,232 in National Defense Student Loan funds, \$108,660 in Work Study Program funds, and \$53,848 in educational opportunity grants for needy students. Among the other gifts and grants was one of \$7,500 from Christ Church Cranbrook in Bloomfield Hills in support of the Pontiac Black Cultural Center.

THREE PROMOTED Three promotions were among OU personnel action approved last week by the MSU Board of Trustees. David C. Bricker was promoted from instructor to assistant professor of education, C. Ronald Horvath from admissions counselor to assistant director of admissions, and Jerry Dahlman from director of off-campus study to administrative director of the School of Performing Arts.

JOINS 'DODGE BOYS' Appointment of Joseph D. Hovansian as professor of engineering was among OU personnel actions approved last week by the MSU Board of Trustees. Hovansian has been associate professor of engineering at Wayne State University and a member of that faculty since 1960. He holds B.S., M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from Michigan State University and is a former chairman of the Southern Michigan Section of the Society for Experimental Stress Analysis. He will serve during the spring term as a visiting professor and assume the permanent appointment next fall.

BLACK HISTORY EXHIBIT "Black Odyssey," an exhibit on black history, will be presented by the Wesley Foundation on Monday, November 24 in the Gold Room of Oakland Center. The exhibit, produced by George Norman, will be displayed from 10: a.m. to 9:00 p.m. It is open to the public with no admission charge.
