## Board Approves Faculty Pact

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved a three-year contract between the university and the OU Chapter of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP).

The union membership ratified the agreement 183-17 in voting March 9-10 to be effective March 1, 1983 through Aug. 15, 1985.

The contract includes an increase of approximately three percent in each of the three years. In 1982-1983, the increase is retroactive to Aug. 15, 1982.

In addition, the union members receive a two percent increase in the university contribution to the employee retirement program in the third year

and medical caps are raised in each of the three years. The medical cap change for 1982-1983 is not retroactive.

In addition to the three percent cap increases, the following indexing formula is in effect for the three years; if Oakland's general fund revenue exceeds 102 percent of the preceding year revenue, as determined at year end, a retroactive salary payment will be made to all continuing full-time faculty. The payment will vary with OU revenue but in no case will exceed four

percent a year; however, if OU's revenue in a given year exceeds the amount necessary to pay the four percent, then the excess will be carried into the current year to determine the index payment for the current year. If the full four percent is not paid in a given year, then the unpaid percentage is carried forward to the subsequent year and the maximum indexed percentage for the subsequent year is increased by the carryover amount.

## Hartman Is New Athletic Director

Oakland University has announced the appointment of Paul Hartman as its new athletic director culminating a six month long search process. Hartman is 47. He will begin his OU duties June 1. He has served as the athletic director of the 9,000 student University of Wisconsin campus at Stevens Point since 1976. Prior to his Wisconsin directorship, Hartman was chairman for health, physical education and recreation at Florida International University. Earlier in his career he was director of athletics and chairman of the department of physical education at Plymouth State College in New Hampshire.

Hartman earned his bachelor of science, master of science and Ph.D. degrees in physical education from Ohio State University. His athletic experience includes playing varsity soccer and lacrosse at Ohio State, teaching physical education, health and recreation courses, coaching at both the high school and collegiate levels and administration. He is author of numerous articles for physical education and coaching journals and holds membership in national professional organizations including the National Association for Collegiate Directors of Athletics. Hartman is also

active in community organizations such as the Boy Scouts and Head Start.

Oakland University President Joseph E. Champagne said, "Paul Hartman is a man who adheres to a highly ethical educational and athletic philosophy which is entirely consistent with that of Oakland University; a philosophy that provides for a balanced emphasis of scholarship and athletics. Hartman has enormous personal integrity, communicates very effectively and he will, I believe, complement well the Oakland University staff."

## New Fiscal Policy

Effective April 1 all long-term agreements (refer to **Oakland University Administrative Policy and Procedures Manual**, Section 085) are to be signed by William Small, Director of Contract Administration, Purchasing and Risk Management rather than the Vice President for Finance and Administration. In addition, Small, as university contracting officer, will hereafter be responsible for signing all contracts for services that are under \$100,000.

The OU Forensics Team has dethroned perennial power Eastern Michigan University to take first place in the State Championship of the Michigan Intercollegiate Speech League.

OU has been second in the state for the past four years and Eastern Michigan University, second ranked nationally, placed first in the state for 11 straight years until the recent championship.

Philip Singer, sociology/anthropology, and health behavioral sciences, and Elizabeth A. Titus, library, have just published a book, "An Essay on West African Therapeutics," by Obadiah Johnson. Professor Titus contributed the preface and Professor Singer has written the introduction, "Nigerian Bush-Doctors and W.H.O. Medicine Men—An Arranged Marriage Without Issue." Dr. Johnson was a West African physician who practiced medicine

The volume will appear in November, 1983. Dawson has been asked to record **Suparna** by Charles Dakin with the BBC Philharmonic Orchestra in London this fall. He will present the world premiere of this work along with several others by Dakin during the Contemporary Music Festival '83 to be held at OU April 15, 16 and 17, 1983.

## CU Lowers Rates

The credit union has reduced the cost of revolving credit (unsecured) loans from 18 percent to 16 percent now through July 31 to reduce interest costs for over 6,000 members with over \$9 million in loans outstanding.

Manager John Savio said the move was made because of the lower costs of obtaining funds and the credit union's desire to pass the savings along to members. Savio said the credit union will take another look at rates at the end of the current period.

Savio reminds members that the credit union has expanded its charter to include membership for any persons related by blood or marriage, including sons and daughters living out of the household.
