Teaching/Learning awards announced

Five awards have been announced by the Oakland University Teaching and Learning Committee to strengthen various disciplines at the institution.

The awards of from \$500 to \$1,000 each will support a new approach to community health nursing theory, a study of computer architecture, retraining for faculty in mathematical sciences, and environmental studies.

The yearly awards program was authorized three years ago by Frederick W. Obear, academic vice president and provost, on a competitive basis. Faculty are encouraged to look at outstanding

programs at other institutions to see if the approaches would be suitable at OU.

One award of \$972 will be used to support a visit of Roderick Nash, author and professor of history and environmental studies at the University of California, Santa Barbara. The visit is supported by four OU programs, the Department of History, environmental studies, American studies, and the public policy program of the Department of Political Science. New environmental studies courses will benefit each of these programs.

Some \$1,000 was granted for an educational development proposal in the Department of Mathematical Sciences. The funds will be used to help retrain math faculty in some of the applied areas of mathematical sciences. These applied areas have become increasingly important because of the changing job market and the changing career interests of students.

A \$900 award will support a consultant in the School of Nursing to help senior students improve their assimilation of community health theory.

Dhiraj K. Pradhan, School of Engineering, received \$500 for an educational visit to the University of California at Los Angeles to attend a comprehensive short course on computer architecture. The professor will design and develop courses in this area for graduate and undergraduate levels at OU. The course will be of particular interest for engineering and computer and information science students at the university.

Robert Edgerton, engineering, will get \$1,100 to visit three institutions to see how they are handling undergraduate research participation in engineering projects.

Graduation tips from alumni

Other articles in **The Graduate** are: "How Women Measure Up in the M.B.A. Classroom," "Wide-Eyed and Working in Washington," "Traveling to Europe," and "Fifty Years of College Fads."

Art gallery exhibits gifts

The Meadow Brook Art Gallery will present a new exhibit entitled "Recent Gifts to the University Art Collection" from April 15 through May 20.

A majority of the gifts on exhibition in the gallery in Wilson Hall are prints by contemporary artists including Alexander Calder, Pierre Alechinsky, Karel Appel, and Richard Lindner.

Among the works are Appel's series "The Sunshine People," Lindner's "Shoot" series and Edward Ruscha's organic screenprints containing "News," "Mews," "Pews," "Brews," "Stews," and "Dues." There are also prints by Mark Tobey, "Mandarin and Flowers," "Chinese Memories," and others.

Two paintings by European artists on view are by the German artist Karl Pfahler and Michael Challenger of Britain.

Included are sculptures by the American pop artist George Siegel, an op construction "Black Moving Planes" by Mon Levinson, and a wood carving by K.M. Chung, a Cranbrook graduate.

The university has received a number of art works in this exhibition from individuals in Michigan. Also, through the efforts of the Martin S. Ackerman Foundation of New York, the gallery has received works from collectors in New York, Connecticut and Paris, France.

OAKLAND UNIVERSITY

A General Statement of Policy on University Archives

The university archives collects and preserves the significant records which chronicle the history of the university. The archives serve not only as a depository but as a comprehensive and systematic instrument for institutional research relative to administrative decision-making, educational marketing analysis, and scholarship in education.

Any intramural record created for an official university purpose may be regarded as suitable for inclusion in the archives. These records may be created by an individual, committee, or an office. Primary examples of these records include official university publications, documents produced by the several governance bodies, and the non-current administrative office files. Ephemeral materials, including announcements, flyers, programs and similar memorabilia, computer tape, punched cards, blue prints, and photographs fall within the context of official records. The scope of the archives, however, need not be limited to these official records. Upon the recommendation of the librarian responsible for archives, the archives may also house the personal papers of members of the Board and administration, faculty, staff, student body and the alumni, and other persons and organizations that have made substantial contributions to the university and its mission.

In order to promote the orderly flow of institutional records from the source of origin to the archives, several principles, including those of ownership, transference, confidentiality and formatting will be established:

- (1) All records produced within the university for an official purpose are considered the property of Oakland University.
- (2) Except for confidential personnel records, official records of the university should periodically be transferred from the originating office to the archives in accordance with schedules and procedures established for that purpose.
- (3) Certain records, for confidentiality or other reasons, may be excluded from public view or have reasonable restrictions placed on their use for limited periods of time.
- (4) Some records, owing to their age or quantity, may be reformatted by standard reprographic methods as a matter of routine processing when they are added to the collections.

Decisions regarding the acceptance of materials for inclusion in the archives, access to the collections and the general administration of the archives are the responsibility of the University Library, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees. When such decisions are made, they will encompass an assessment and representation of the best interests of the entire university community.

Lentz receives \$15,000 grant

The U.S. Office of Education, through the Women's Educational Equity Act, has awarded a research grant of \$15,000 to Linda Lentz, School of Human and Educational Services, to study the career development of female graduates of women's and coeducational colleges.

Lentz's studies began in 1975, when she assessed the career salience of women entering five women's colleges and nine coeducational colleges at three selectivity levels. She found that women enrolling in very selective women's colleges were more career salient than women matriculating at coeducational colleges of the same selectivity.

Whether this difference exists one year after college graduation, what factors predict career involvement one year after

graduation, and whether those factors are the same or have the same significance for women graduating from women's colleges and coed schools, and if there is a relationship between the level of career aspiration and the type of college attended will be several of the questions Lentz will explore in her follow-up study. Her research will be conducted during the 1979-80 academic year.

"How to" seminar

In response to requests for training in the area of "research grantsmanship," the Center for Community and Human Development is sponsoring a two-day seminar on the subject, Monday and Tuesday, June 4-5, 1979.

Among items discussed will be: research proposal preparation and critique; tools and resources for proposal writers; budgeting principles; project management; Oakland University proposal procedures, etc.

The training will be conducted by John Buskey, associate dean of Continuing Studies at the University of Nebraska. Buskey has led similar workshops at universities throughout the United States.
