CULTURE INTERNATIONALE: Sunday, Jan. 15, is the main day of the 10-day festival. Cafe Internationale, featuring cosmopolitan cuisine, will be open from noon to 7 p.m. The art and book displays will be open from noon to 9 p.m. Alphonse Okuku, brother of Kenya Nationalist leader Tom Mboya, will speak at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. in the Student Center. Following each of his talks, there will be a program of international entertainment provided by Michigan State University, University of Michigan, Wayne State University and MSUO. At 4:30 p.m., the Italian film, "Christ Did Not Stop at Eboli," will be shown. Following this, at 5 p.m., the 45-minute travel film, "Wonderful World," will be shown. Also at 5 p.m., there will be a seminar with foreign students.

Costumes from around the world will be modeled by the girls in Orchesis at 8 :30 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 18, in the Student Center. This is the final event of the festival and is being produced by Delta Air Lines.

MOVIE TIME: "Away All Boats," World War II sea drama starring Richard Boone will be shown tonight, Friday, Jan. 13 at 8:15 p.m. and again Sunday, Jan. 15 at 8:15 in 156 North Foundation Hall.

This will be the last film shown, Mr. Fritz announces. "Due to an almost total lack of attendance at the Friday and Sunday night movies," he said, "all future films have been cancelled. This program of films was planned as a weekend activity for members of the university. However, since no single film has yet supported itself financially there is no choice other than to regretfully abandon the series."

ART SHOW: A group of 20 paintings, drawings and sculptures by Irving Zupnick of the Art Department at Harpur College, Endicott, N. Y. will be shown in the Gallery at the MSUO Student Center from Jan. 18 through Jan. 31. Dr. Zupnick is active in the fields of both Art History and Creative Studio Work. A native of New York City, he received his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees at Columbia University. Before accepting a position at Harpur College he taught at the City College of New York, Dartmouth, and San Antonio College. He was in charge of the Fourth Army's five-state art program in the Southwest during the mid-50's. Dr. Zupnick has exhibited actively for several years and has been represented in over a score of group showings. He also has four one-man exhibits to his credit and has published a number of articles and reviews. He has taught painting, drawing, and the history of art. The forthcoming exhibit of Dr. Zupnick's pictures is co-sponsored by the MSUO Art Department and the Committee on Cultural Programs.
