The Student Center Council is a group of students who act as a liaison between the student body and the management of the Student Center in regard to student activities within the Center. The group was formed last November when Mr. Fritz, Student Center head, and a group of students -- Marge Swoboda, Janet Long, Gary MacDoughal, and George Stillman from the MSUO Recreational Committee -- attended the Region V Conference of college unions held in Oxford, Ohio. From this conference many ideas on student union activities were gathered. When they returned, it was decided to use this group plus two others Jannet Kelley and Tony Hammer, as a nucleus of the Council.

The group was then divided into five committees headed by the original members. The committees are Cultural Arts, headed by George Stillman; Special Events, guided by Janet Long; Social, with Jannet Kelly chairman; Tournaments under Gary MacDoughal; and Publicity, handled by Tony Hammer. On election day the Young Dems hope to offer a baby-sitting and transportation service. This service will be offered to any who need it.

The objective of the council is to bring a social and cultural program of events to the Center for the benefit of all students. Thus far they have sponsored many activities: a jazz concert, various dances, a fashion show by Waites of Pontiac, and several tournaments. The Council also sponsored a program of dramatic and satirical readings by students and an art exhibit of Saturday Evening Post covers.

Every month the Council selects a boy and girl as representative of the all-around MSUO student. The selection is the job of the Special Events Committee who submit nominations to the committee heads. From this list of possible candidates, a final selection is based on scholarship and activity in school affairs is made by the Board of Governors, which includes the committee heads and the acting secretary.
