OU presents "Crisis Intervention in the Classroom" workshop

Rochester, Michigan, September 1, 2004 – Oakland University's School of Education and Human Services (SEHS) will offer "Crisis Intervention in the Classroom," a workshop on how to safely manage disruptive student behavior. The seminar will be held on Saturdays, October 16 through November 6, from 9 a.m. – 3:45 p.m. at Oakland University. The deadline to register is Thursday, September 9.

Kathleen Young, a certified non-violent crisis intervention instructor, will lead the workshop. Young is clinical manager for Behavioral Health, a division of St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital of Macomb. She has served as a psychiatric nurse clinician, staff development coordinator for mental healthcare programs, and direct care provider for adults and children with mental illnesses and chemical dependency.

Designed for educators, administrators, school counselors, and support staff, participants will learn to recognize warning signs and symptoms of mental illness and behavior. Defusing disruptive behavior, setting enforceable limits with students, effectively responding to a crisis situation, and physical safety skills will be addressed.

The cost of the workshop is \$295, if enrolled for non-credit, continuing education. There is an option to take the course for two university graduate credits.
