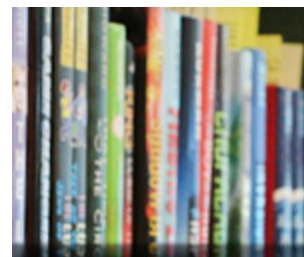

Weekly ERL Update: Digital Learning Resources



When considering current events in the classroom, it is important to be able to access arguments and opinions on all sides of an issue. The series *Opposing Viewpoints in Context* has always been a great resource, and many of you may remember or have used the print version.

The digital version is owned and operated by Gale and is available to all Michigan residents through the [Michigan e-Library \(MeL\)](#). It is now known as [Gale in Context: Opposing Viewpoints](#). Students can search for topics of interest, and results will include information, articles, images, statistics, primary sources, opinion pieces and much more, presenting an all-around view of the topic from various points of view. You can filter by date published, full text available, content level, etc.

On the results page, there is a helpful “Topic Finder” tool which will help users find more articles and information related to their original search. For a good example of the array of results, try a search for DACA.
