OAKLAND HOUSING, INC. SEEKS WOODGROVE APPLICANTS

Oakland Housing, Inc., a non-profit trust, has announced an unusual new housing program designed to assist families who desire a new home but who are unable to purchase due to the high cost of interest and construction costs today.

Woodgrove Condominiums, approximately one mile south of Rochester and off Avon Road, is the first phase of this program.

Applicants for trust benefits will be considered from those families: whose family income does not exceed the range established by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority for its moderate income housing program; the principal wage earner of which is regularly employed; the principal wage earner of which is of such an age and has such a credit standing as to allow satisfactory fulfillment of a long-term land contract obligation; for which occupancy of a Woodgrove dwelling unit will represent a major improvement in their housing and environmental situation; which may through receipt of Oakland's Woodgrove benefits gain educational, recreational, social or cultural advantages which are not available in its current housing situation; and for which the reduced housing costs in Oakland's Woodgrove will provide an opportunity to better care for the family or to allow family members to advance in a trade, business or profession.

Oakland Housing, Inc. was formed in 1935 by the late Senator James Couzens for the purpose of helping provide new homes for young American families. The typical family will have an income in the \$9,000 to \$14,000 range although some higher incomes may be approved. The program provides for a significant reduction in principal and interest payments in early years of the land contract in an effort to provide a hedge against inflation.

MATT LOWRY, TODDLER PROGRAM DIES FROM CRASH INJURIES

Matt Lowry, teacher, and co-director in OU's Toddler Center, died Wednesday morning, July 3, from injuries sustained in a two-car accident Friday, June 28, at Crooks and Adams Roads. Lowry, 26, had been hospitalized in Crittenton Hospital along with Becky Reid, a passenger in his auto. Miss Reid, also 26, was a co-director with Lowry of the Toddler Center. Both hold their Master of Arts in Teaching degrees from Oakland University. Lowry had been unconscious since the accident. Miss Reid remains hospitalized.

A memorial service for Lowry was held Thursday, July 4, at the University Presbyterian Church at Adams and Butler Roads. A memorial fund in Lowry's honor will be established by the OU School of Education. Lowry's family resides in Redlands, California.

SAN FRANCISCO BALLET APPEARS AT MEADOW BROOK

The San Francisco Ballet will appear at Meadow Brook Festival on July 11, 13 and 14 replacing the previously booked National Ballet which disbanded earlier this month. This is the San Francisco company's premiere appearance at Meadow Brook and on its first engagement east of the Mississippi in over ten years.

"Harp Concerto," which premiered in 1973 by the San Francisco Ballet, will open their program on Thursday, July 11. "The Eternal Idol," "Divertissement d' Auber," and "Symphony in C," will complete the first program.

On Saturday evening, July 13, at 8:30, the San Francisco Ballet will again perform "Harp Concerto," "Airs de Ballet," and "The Four Temperaments."

**2,000 YOUTHS PARTICIPATE
IN YOUTH FITNESS MEET**

More than 2,000 boys and girls between the ages of 10 and 15 will compete Thursday, July 25, in the 17th annual Metropolitan Area Youth Fitness Meet to be held at Oakland University.

Participants are from 54 Michigan communities and include representatives from as far west as Ann Arbor and as far north as Port Huron. The competitors have been selected for the finals through competitions within their respective communities.

Co-sponsors for the 1974 program are the Northwest Parks and Recreation Association and the Oakland County V.F.W. Oakland University is host.

Three age group competitions will be held for the boys and for the girls. Class A is for 14 and 15-year olds; class B is for 12 and 13-years olds; and class C is for boys and girls ages 10 and 11. The Area Youth Fitness Meet emblems and trophies are being presented by the Oakland County V.F.W. Post.

Events include the 50-yard dash, softball throw, standing and running board jump, running and standing hop, step and jump, chinning, and shuttle relays.

The youth fitness meet supports the objectives of the president's Council on Youth Fitness, encourages public and private agencies to launch special youth fitness programs on a year-round basis, and encourages participation in sports by promotion of competitive games for boys and girls through every means possible.

VISITS AT WESTLAND CENTER**

Oakland University will open a three-day educational advising and career information center at the Westland Center, 35000 Warren, in Westland, Friday, July 26, through Sunday, July 28.

Hours are from noon to 9:00 p.m. on the 26th and 27th and from noon to 5:00 p.m. on the 28th.

Professional counselors from the Office of Admissions will meet with students and adults in an attempt to bring the university out into the community," explained Edward J. Bagale, associate director of admissions. "We expect to reach a new segment of the southeastern Michigan population and to provide a counseling service for many people who have never visited a university campus before," Bagale said.

The OU counselors will discuss educational and scholarship opportunities in higher education and provide career counseling for all interested persons. The program is offered in cooperation with the Westland Center. Previous successful OU advising centers have been held in the Oakland, Saginaw and Macomb areas.

**HASSE NAMED
WRESTLING COACH**

Max Hasse, coach of Rochester High School's 1973-74 championship wrestling squad, has been named to the part-time position of wrestling coach at Oakland University. Hasse will begin his duties next fall, Corey Van Fleet, athletic director, has

announced.

Wrestling will be contested on a club basis for the 1974-75 season but will begin intercollegiate competition during the 1975-76 school year with a full schedule and participation in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Van Fleet said.

Hasse has impressive credentials beginning with his own wrestling career at Teaneck, New Jersey High School followed by three years of varsity wrestling at Michigan State University, Van Fleet said.

Hasse began his teaching career at Pontiac Central High School where he also coached the wrestling and football teams from 1966 to 1969. He was then named to the head wrestling coach position at Rochester Adams High School. He had winning teams from 1969 to 1972, highlighted by a perfect 15-0 record during the 1970-1971 season. The team's success resulted in league and district championships and Hasse was named Oakland County's "Coach of the Year" by the Oakland Press. He switched to Rochester High School for the 1973-74 season and his team immediately won a league championship with a 14-2 record.

Hasse spends much of his personal time working with the U.S. Federation of Wrestling and the A.A.U. wrestling program which includes many camps, clinics and physical fitness activities. He is presently the Rochester coach for the Marine Youth Physical Fitness Program where he has produced three individual state champions, three team state champions and three mid-western regional champions.

"We are extremely fortunate to have somebody of Max's knowledge and enthusiasm join our athletic staff" according to Gene Boldon, Oakland's Associate Director of Athletics. "He will be a major asset to our program."

Max lives in Utica with his wife, Sandy, and his nine-year-old son, Mark.
