OU IN COMPLIANCE WITH TITLE IX

The university committee appointed by President Donald D. O'Dowd to concern itself with the implications of Title IX legislation for all university programs has completed its review and reports that Oakland University is virtually in compliance with the Title IX guidelines in all areas as it relates to policies and practices. Some minor changes are being recommended for women's athletics.

The committee is now turning its attention to the areas of attitudes and assumptions and their impact on sex discrimination at Oakland University. 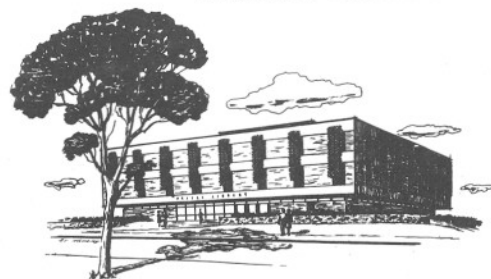

BOARD APPROVES SEVEN APPOINTMENTS

Seven new faculty appointments and five changes of status were approved by the Oakland University Board of Trustees in personnel actions September 22.

New faculty are Robert W. Brown, assistant professor of education, Wilma R. Garcia, special instructor in learning skills, Stanley W. Hollingsworth, assistant professor of music, Connie M. Johnson, special instructor in nursing, Hedwig J. Kuczynski, associate professor of nursing, Lawrence M. Lewis, assistant professor of learning skills, and James W. McGinnis, assistant professor of education. McGinnis has been employed by OU as director of the Oakland Prep School. All of the appointments were effective on August 15.

Receiving changes of status were Marvin Holladay, moves from assistant professor of music to special instructor in music with job security; Janet A. Krompart, assistant professor of the library and has the additional responsibility of associate dean, technical services; Jacob A. Mayala is promoted to assistant professor of education; William G. Pfaff, former instructor in physical education becomes manager of athletic enterprises; and Howard R. Witt, professor of engineering and associate dean of engineering assumes the additional responsibilities of acting dean.

PAY WITHHELD FROM STRIKERS: STATE EXACTS PENALTY HOUSE FOR SALE

Oakland University has withheld \$74,000 from the September 30 paychecks of 256 faculty who failed to meet classes during the September 1-3 strike. Faculty members have ten days to request hearings.

The state, in turn, has cut OU's September appropriation through a strike penalty clause in the 1975-76 appropriations bill.

The OU decision to withhold pay from striking faculty members was made at the time of the strike. The action became a legal necessity when the state said it would delay the university's September appropriations payment of \$1,000,000 until a penalty deduction was made.

The 1975-76 appropriations bill provides for a strike penalty to the institution of 1/365 of a striker's salary for each day of a strike. The 1975-76 laws were in effect because the state's 1976-77 fiscal year did not begin until October 1. There is no strike penalty clause in the new appropriations bill.

The university appropriation has been reduced \$41,600, the amount OU estimates it owes the state under the strike penalty formula. However, the university has withheld \$74,000 based on its own formula of withholding 1/180 of a person's pay for each day of services withheld.

This represents a proration based on the service which should have been rendered over the academic year as opposed to the calendar year had not services been withheld.

An adjustment in the \$41,600 state penalty will be made at the end of the appeal process if one is warranted.

OU TRUSTEES ELECT SCHWARTZ, LEWIS

Alan E. Schwartz, 50, is chairperson and David B. Lewis, 32, is the new vice chairperson. The trustees are charter members of the eight-member OU board.

Schwartz replaces Arthur W. Saltzman, a Franklin consultant, who had served two one-year terms. Saltzman remains on the board. The board passed a resolution praising Saltzman for his leadership over the past two years. The former vice chairperson was East Lansing attorney Leland W. Carr, Jr., who resigned early last year because of business pressures.

Schwartz is a member of the firm of Honigman, Miller, Schwartz, and Cohn. He holds an undergraduate degree from the University of Michigan, and he received his law degree magna cum laude from Harvard University. He has been a member of the Meadow Brook Theatre Committee, and he is a trustee of the Oakland University Foundation.

Lewis has his own law firm. He holds an undergraduate degree from OU, the M.B.A. from the University of Chicago, and a law degree from the University of Michigan. As an OU senior, Lewis won the Alfred G. Wilson award given for

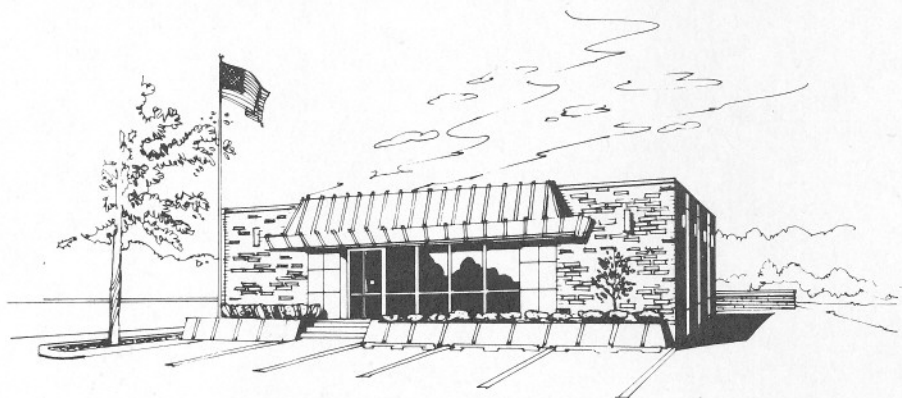

OU SETS \$20,000 GOAL IN UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN

The university has a \$20,000 goal in the Pontiac-North Oakland County United Way drive that opened October 1 on campus. The campaign will continue here for students, faculty, and staff through October 18. The university raised \$16,000 in 1975.

Janet Krompart, 1976 United Way chairperson, said representatives have been appointed to cover all areas of campus. Additional flyers and pledge cards can be obtained by calling 377-2495.

A few of the local benefits from the 1975 campaign included 4,752 persons getting food and assistance from the Salvation Army, programs for 8,875 girls through the Northern Oakland County Girl Scout Council, and services to 1,310 persons through the Oakland County Legal Aid Society.

OU GIFTS, GRANTS HIT \$980,501

The Oakland Board of Trustees accepted \$980,501 in gifts and grants at the September 22 meeting on campus.

The sum includes \$756,038 from the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to support financial aid programs. The grant periods are from July 1, 1976, through June 30, 1977.

Other grants include \$72,662 from the United States Office of Human Development to the Continuum Center for a peer group counseling program for older people and two grants of \$86,901 from the National Institutes of Health (NIH).
