OU plans budget cuts

The 15th annual Career Workshops and Competitive Scholarship Examination will be held Feb. 22 with 2,000 Michigan high school students and parents as guests on campus. The program opens at noon in the Lepley Sports Center. Career workshops will be held from 1:40 to 5 p.m. and two competitive scholarship examinations will be given, one at 1:40 p.m. and the second at 2:55 p.m. Students can earn scholarships of \$800 a year awarded without regard to family income.

Poet Galway Kinnell will read from his own works March 9 at 1 p.m. in the Gold Room of the Oakland Center. Kinnell appears under auspices of the Michigan Council for the Humanities, the English Department at the University of Michigan, and the OU Department of English. Kinnell is a professor at the University of Hawaii and he has served as visiting poet or faculty member at a number of institutions including Sarah Lawrence, Columbia, Brandeis, and Princeton. There is no charge.

Dawn M. Santy, an Honors College student and engineering major, is the recipient of a \$1,000 scholarship from the Bendix Corporation for 1980-81. Dawn is a member of the OU Engineering Society and a student member of the Engineering Society of Detroit.

Forty hospital/health agency representatives will be on campus on February 23, from 2 to 5 p.m. to talk with students interested in the health fields, especially nursing. Students wishing to talk with these representatives should come to the Crockery in the Oakland Student Center during these hours. Despite a recommendation by Governor Milliken for a healthy increase in state appropriation, university officials are preparing a 1981-82 budget that involves deep cuts in operating expenditures.

The Governor last month recommended a 12.4% increase in Oakland's state appropriation for the state fiscal year beginning October 1. OU's current state appropriation is \$18,709,800. If approved by the Legislature, OU's appropriation for the fiscal year would be \$21,029,064.

"We appreciate the governor's support of higher education in his recommendation," said Interim President George T. Matthews, "but the fiscal situation of the state is too unstable to predict the final outcome of the appropriation process."

Matthews noted the 1980-81 final budget was nearly \$2.8 million less than the governor's original recommendation (see box below).

"We were prepared this year because we planned very conservatively," Matthews said. "We are doing the same for next year."

The University Budget Committee has been meeting since late fall, first to deal with the shortfall in state appropriation for 1980-81, and more recently to plan

the 1981-82 budget.

Each operating division of the university has been asked to submit possible budget reductions, based on proportional shares of the total university operating budget. The target reduction figure is just under \$3 million from current budgets. The figure is higher than the anticipated deficit (some \$1.5-2.0 million), in order to provide some room for adjustments.

The committee is chaired by Robert W. Swanson, vice-president for business affairs. Other members of the committee are Wilma H. Roy-Bledsoe, assistant to the president and director of urban affairs; George A. Catton, director of campus affairs; Jack R. Moeller, acting dean of the College of Arts and Sciences; Ronald M. Horwitz, dean of the School of Economics and Management; Frederick W. Obear, vice-president for academic affairs; Jack T. Wilson, dean for student life; William W. Connellan, director of public relations and information services; and Keith R. Kleckner, associate provost. Roy T. Harris, budget director, and Interim President Matthews sit with the budget committee as ex-officio members.
