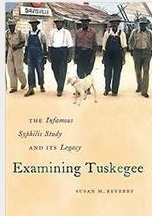

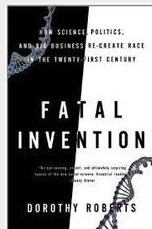

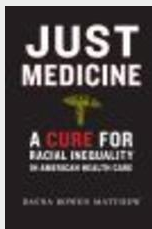

OUWB Publishes on COVID-19

In addition to other ways the COVID-19 pandemic has changed our lives, it has also altered the scientific publishing cycle, with articles on the topic rushing to press. As of June 25, 2020, a search of the PubMed database retrieved 26,216 articles on the topic! A specialized database from the National Library of Medicine called [LitCovid](#) presents results graphically and has a helpful interface that allows searching by country, article type, and other key concepts. Check it out!
