## FRIDAY NIGHT POP CONCERTS ADDED TO FESTIVAL LINEUP

From the Nobody-Tells-Us-Anything Department comes this belated report on the new season of the Meadow Brook Music Festival: a series of "all-star" popular musical programs on Friday nights will be added to the lineup of traditional classical programs featuring the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and guest artists. In place of the two Detroit Symphony programs, each of which was repeated, the symphony will present three different programs on Thursday, Saturday and Sunday nights. The Friday night concerts, drawing on the success of the "pop festivals" of 1968 and the "special series concerts" last summer, will feature leading recording and television performers.

The change was described as a diversifying move to appeal to a wider audience. The eight-week season opens June 25 and will be highlighted by a special program commemorating the 200th anniversary of the birth of Beethoven and one week of ballet. An announcement of part of the season's program will be made later this month, and the rest will be announced during April. We'll try not to miss those.

## OU PLAYS HOST TO NCAA SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS

More than 450 athletes from some 100 schools will be on campus this week as the University plays host to the seventh annual college division of the NCAA Swimming Championships. Competition in the Sports and Recreation Building pool begins Thurs. afternoon and continues through Saturday night. Ticket prices are \$1 for afternoon preliminaries and \$2 for evening final sessions. Tickets and complete schedules may be picked up in the Sports and Recreation Building.

OU has three students who will compete in the championships, divers Jack Parker and Bob Bishop and freestyler Mike Campbell. Parker and Campbell won all-American honors in last year's competition.

## LANGUAGE ARTS FESTIVAL TONIGHT

A Language Arts Festival will be held this evening (Monday) at 8 p.m. in the Sports and Recreation Building. Students of the French and Spanish departments will present folk dancing, songs and poetry, and will be dressed in the native costumes of France, Spain and Latin America. A 50¢ donation is asked. OU students will be admitted free.

#### NEW DRAMA GROUP PRESENTING PLAY ON RACISM

Ujamaa Theatre Workshop, an offshoot of the Pontiac Black Cultural Center, is producing *The Man Nobody Saw* by Elizabeth Blake as its first offering. The drama is described as a "stark, moving and powerful play highlighting the effects of racism." The play was presented in Toledo last week and will be repeated at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Birmingham Community House and at 8 p.m. next Tuesday, March 24, at Oakland University under the auspices of the University Women's Club.

Members of the cast are Augustine Wright, William Hollis, OU student Chris Northcross, and OU faculty members Harvey Burdick (psychology) and his wife Dolores (modern languages). Mrs. Wright (urban affairs) is executive director of the drama group.

#### EKLUND SPEAKS

Dean Lowell Eklund (continuing education) appeared on a panel Saturday, March 14, at the University of Michigan Institute of Gerontology seminar in Higher Education for the Aging. His presentation was based on his chapter in an anthology on education and aging recently published by the Russell Sage Foundation.

Today Eklund is in Reno, Nevada, speaking before a University of Nevada conference focusing on "The Needs and Interests of the Public for Continuing Education." His subject is "Post Graduate Professional Education" which was nationally pioneered at Oakland University in Continuing Education.

#### AD HOC COMMITTEE WILL AID IN PROVOST SELECTION

The University Senate on March 12 approved establishment of an ad hoc committee to consult with the Chancellor in the selection of a Provost. The committee membership will include the following: five representatives from the College of Arts and Sciences, two representatives each from the School of Education and the School of Engineering, one representative each from the School of Economics and Management and the School of Performing Arts, one representative from the professional library staff, one representative from the administrative-professional association and one representative to be chosen by the Steering Committee to represent general education.

#### FIVE NAMED TO SUMMER SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The University Senate approved five nominees to the Summer School Committee. They are: John Beardman, chairman; John Barnard; David Doane; Robert Donald; Henry Kennedy; and Paul Tombouliau. The four additional members will include Lewis Pino, dean of the summer school; a representative from the Steering Committee; a student; and a representative from the office of the Vice Provost for Student Affairs. The Senate also discussed a request to seek authorization from the Board of Trustees to establish a department of linguistics and recommendations for reclassification of freshman exploratory courses. The items were not eligible for vote at the March 12 meeting.
